Nearly 2500 youth all around Sri Lanka assembled at the Cinnamon Garden Police Station premises under the patronage

of the Youth Affairs and Skills Development Minister Dallus Alahapperuma. Vast number of veteran artists, scholars, politicians and foreign representatives were also present. The youth peace march started from the police grounds towards the Independence Square.

The foreign volunteers who are working in Sri Lanka in vivid projects for the betterment of the youth played a major role at the parade.

The message sent by the secretary of the United Nations (UN) Ban Ki Moon was read out by a youth at the special platform built in Independence Square. The marching
